> Re: Response to Request for Changed Circumstances Review of the Antidumping Order on Raw Honey from the Socialist Republic of Vietnam

Dear Secretary Raimondo:

On behalf of Steel Dynamics, Inc. ("SDI"), the American Shrimp Processors Association ("ASPA"), and the American Kitchen Cabinet Alliance ("AKCA"), we write to oppose the request filed by the Socialist Republic of Vietnam ("Vietnam") seeking to have the U.S. Department of Commerce ("Commerce") conduct a changed circumstances review to determine that Vietnam should no longer be treated as a nonmarket economy under Section 771(18) of the Trade Act of 1930, as amended (the "Act"). Vietnam remains a nonmarket economy as defined in the statute, and any determination otherwise would undermine the enforcement of the antidumping law and expose domestic producers of a wide range of products to unfair trade.

SDI, the ASPA, and the AKCA support the arguments made by U.S. raw honey petitioners in their October 6, 2023 submission in opposition to Vietnam's changed circumstances review request. The raw honey petitioners demonstrated that Vietnam's request suffers from fatal

procedural and substantive defects. First, while Section 751(b)(1) of the Act permits Commerce to review a "final affirmative determination that resulted in an antidumping duty order" in light of changed circumstances, Vietnam failed to identify *any* circumstances that had changed since Commerce issued its final affirmative determination on raw honey from Vietnam on April 14, 2022. Instead, Vietnam focused its request entirely on circumstances that have allegedly changed in Vietnam since 2002, the last time Commerce determined that Vietnam remained a nonmarket economy. Any such circumstances would have existed on April 14, 2022, and therefore cannot be "changed" within the meaning of Section 751(b)(1).

Although this procedural defect is sufficient by itself to reject Vietnam's request, Vietnam has also failed to prove that it satisfies the statutory factors necessary to grant market economy status under Section 771(18)(B) of the Act.³ In their October 6, 2023 submission, the raw honey petitioners presented information showing that the Government of Vietnam (1) interferes with the currency and financial markets; (2) restricts the foreign exchange market; (3) restricts foreign investment; (4) controls the labor market; (5) controls the Vietnamese economy through its state-owned enterprise sector and distorts wages and prices; and (6) maintains complete ownership of real estate. Any determination that Vietnam is a market economy, despite the existence of these conditions, would prevent U.S. producers from competing on a level playing field. It would also signal a weakening of the standard for market economy status, encouraging other countries to follow Vietnam's example and compounding the injury to American producers.

If Commerce nevertheless decides to initiate a changed circumstances review to evaluate Vietnam's nonmarket economy status — and it should not — domestic producers affected by unfair trade from Vietnam should be allowed to participate fully in the proceeding, including by submitting factual information and comments in opposition to granting Vietnam market economy status.
